I have so many Willis lines, not my own, while my own particular James remains elusive. James
Willis was b 1755 m Elizabeth Wilson (Bible), d 1796 Chatham Co, NC, leaving will naming ch:
Sukey; Jemima; Wilson (eldest son); Larkin b 1777 m Mary Reese; Molley m perhaps Walton;
Nanney; youngest sons Elisha & Elijah; Rebecca Caudle; Salley Crow. Witness: Mechuel Wilson
Jr & Samuel Wilson; Exers; Wilson Willis & Thomas Bell. Old Bible says "relatives lived on
Richland Creek in KY". Sons Wilson, Elijah & Elisha went to Robertson Co, Tenn by ca 1815;
son Larkin (mine) went to Hawkins Co, Tenn by ca 1804 where he d 1859. I have the desc of
Larkin in Tenn, Ala, Mo & Texas up to ca 1900. Now, for 3 years, I have been trying to find the
parents of James & Elizabeth (Wilson) Willis, both "said" to have been b in VA.

If by some vast miracle, you know anything of this Willis line, I would appreciate any
information at all, references, addresses or just anything.

OHIO RECORDS AND PIONEER FAMILIES "WILLIS-

Dear Mr Willis:

Enclosed is a pedigree chart showing our connection to the RUCKER family. I have been unable to locate a WILLIS-RUCKER marriage in my records, but many of my records on the RUCKER family are not complete. (Opal Fellows is my wife's mother.) We are trying to make our information as complete as possible so would like very much to correspond with everyone interested in the RUCKERS.

I am now trying to substantiate the lineage as given on the enclosed chart as there are some discrepancies between different sources. My information is from the book HISTORY OF THE RUCKER FAMILY AND THEIR DESCENDANTS (or) RUCKERS AND CONNECTIONS by Edythe Johns Rucker Whitley, pub 1927.

John RUCKER b abt 1794 in Virginia md _____. In early youth he moved to Monroe Co, Ohio with his parents and (there evidently married) and had Ruth who married Uriah Hague in Ohio. Their daughter, Mary Jane Hague, was born 18 Feb 1856 in Lawrence Co, Ohio. We believe Ruth RUCKER died in Lawrence Co, Ohio about 1860. Uriah Hague married a 16 year old German girl who raised his family and also bore Uriah 3 or 4 more sons. Uriah moved to Missouri and Mary Lane Hague married Samuel Wesley Lilly at Stanberry, Gentry Co, MO.

Many of these RUCKERS were from Culpeper Co, VA. The only Susan (Susannah) I have found that would be about the same time of your Susanna is: Susannah (Peter 3, Thomas 2, Peter 1) b Culpeper Co, VA 1776 (Probably 1766) d in Pine Ridge, Miss on 12 Dec 1835 md 10 July 1784 to John Bisland b in Scotland March of 1742 and d in Pine Ridge on April 17, 1821. Many of the RUCKERS from VA went into Ohio, Georgia and Mississippi.

From the Gallia Co, marriage records: Uriah RUCKER md Polly Stewart Aug 25, 1842, and Robert RUCKER married Elizabeth Vermillion 27 Feb 1814. They are father and son and may be connected to our RUCKERS as the name is scarce in that part of Ohio.

Larkin RUCKER, a cousin of Ruth RUCKER (who married Uriah HAGUE) married Ruth's daughter Mary Jane, husband's sister. In other words, Larkin RUCKER married Amanda LILLY, the sister of Samuel Wesley LILLY, who married Mary Jane Hague.

There might very possibly be a connection with these families as they are all from the same state and living in the same area.

My information has come from THE RUCKER FAMILY by Mrs Sudie R Wood.

RUCKERS AND CONNECTIONS by Edythe J R Whitley

There are some things that have to be corrected between these two books, however, and I can't find two people who agree on the validity of these two books. Some say one is best and some say the other and I don't know yet which is the best.

Please write, we are interested in exchanging what information we have. Thank you very much.

Dear Mr Willis:

I have recently run across more RUCKER and HAGUE information from Lawrence Co, Ohio. I would appreciate beginning a correspondence with you and possibly exchanging information. I have several relatives on the RUCKER side who are willing to do research and also I have a researcher in Maryland and one in Delaware doing National Archives searching for me. Also, in our family, there are two researchers doing research in the Salt Lake Library at Salt Lake, Utah.

So, all in all, I have been gathering quite a bit of information on my Hagues and Ruckers. We would be willing to share out information with you, if you are interested.

I am sorry that I have not written sooner as these people could just as well have been looking for WILLIS information also. A lady in New York charges for her help (very reasonable) the others have been researching along with their own names and the only thing it has cost has been expenses, for which I am very grateful.

Of there is any specific problem we could help you with, we would be glad to check our records for you.

Briefly our Rucker connection is as follows:

Ruth Rucker, born 1829 in Monroe Co, Ohio (I think a dau of John & Sally Graham Rucker, but no proof yet) md, Uriah Hague, b 1827 in Ohio, and she died between 1860-1865 in Lawrence Co, Ohio.

Uriah Hague and Ruth Rucker lived in Mason Township, Lawrence Co, Ohio. They had the following children:

John Hague b 1846 in Ohio.

Reuben E Hague (a school teacher) b 1849 in Ohio, md Allie _____ .

Amos R Hague b 16 Oct 1853 in Ohio, md and died 24 Apr 1936 in Mont.

William A Hague b 1854 in Ohio.

Mary Jane Hague b 18 Feb 1856 in Lawrence Co, Ohio, died 23 May 1927, at Juniata, Neb and md at Stanberry Mo, 8 July 1875 Samuel W Lilly.

Martha A Hague b Feb or March 1860 in Ohio.

Now I am searching for a will of John Rucker which may mention a dau, Ruth. Of course, it is very probably that her father was not this John at all. She is not listed in the Wood Rucker Book and her lineage is mentioned, but we feel incorrectly, in the Whitley Rucker Book.

We would appreciate hearing from you concerning the RUCKERS. Would you consider doing some cemetery research for us there in Lawrence Co? Thank you for any help you may be able to give.

Dear Mr Willis:

Would you have records of a Betsy Rucker, who married Jesse Pemberton of Caldwell Co, KY 10-11-1815? America Rucker who married Mason G Pemberton, also of Caldwell Co, KY 7-26-1826.

I am working on Pemberton line. I believe these Pembertons may be of a Wm Pemberton of Adams Co, Ohio and his wife Rhoda (Luck) b 1755. Their children were:

1. James born Oct 16-1777
2. Joyce born Jan 17-1780
3. Wm Jr born may 5-1782
4. Anne born Oct 14-1784
5. Nathaniel born Oct 12-1787
6. Katherine born Feb 13-1790 (died young)
7. Fountain (boy) born Apr 17-1792
8. Katherine Luck born Jan 10-1795
9. Rhoda Jane born Sep 13-1797 md David Ogle
10. Ezekiel born Apr 24, 1800

I have info on parents of Rhoda Luck Pemberton b 1755 and list of who several of these Pemberton children married.

There was one Richard Pemberton who lived at Bethel, Ohio, Clearmont Co, who had a son Miles Pemberton, who was 90 in 1918. There was no doubt other children but this is all I have on this particular family, have some records of Pembertons of Maysville, KY. If you have records that would piece any of this together would sure appreciate it.

I am after Pemberton- Koger-Bruton-Martin-Jones, Atterbury or Attenbury all of KY, Ill and Ohio area.
There were some Pembertons-Brutons-Koger & Jones in Wayne Co, KY. I understand there is a book titled
A Century of Wayne Co, KY by Augusta Philips Johnson, but have not got to see it yet but have it spoken for.

PS One Bennett Pemberton had a daughter who married a Mitchell, I believe in early KY history. Info is being collected by about 5 or 6 of us for a Pemberton book eventually.

Dear Mr Willis;

I have just had the book Colonial Caroline, A History of Caroline Co, VA. by T E Campbell, Dietz Press, Richmond, VA.

I find mention of a "will of Joseph Willis 1768 administrator: Mary Willis Singleton, there was also a mention of a Robert Willis, who had wife Sarah, they owned a tavern, which was damaged & they brought suit against several men for assault & battery 1735.

There was also a Thomas Rucker mentioned & Morgan Edwards. Thos Rucker had a land grant for 1727.

There was also a Uriah Edwards family at one period, because one of his sons Benj md a dau of Chas Pemberton who left Caroline Co, VA abt 1770 for Spotsylvania Co, later to Woodford Co, KY, where he died 1792. (Charles Pemb was a brother of my Richard Pemb who d 1769 Cumb. Co., VA.

In fact I recognized several families who were crossed with Pembertons such as Garnett, Lyon, Head, Crutcher, Beasley, names of Dyer, Dishman, Jurt are allied lines of my Koger line of Wayne Co, KY. The DeJarnette of the book had a Mary Pemberton, wife (they were from Gloucester Co to Caroline Co & I think my Pembertons were of Gloucester from Eng. but most Gloucester records are lost to fire.

In 1748 the Caroline Co Court house was a flourishing County seat with 3 taverns. Robt. Willis, Edward Haswell & Samuel Coleman.

Hope this will help you get a lead on your Willis line.

I have just had the book Gloucester Co, VA by Mary Wiatt Gray 1936, Richmond, VA.

The early records are destroyed so one finds mainly bits & pieces. The first settlers came 1607 and first land patents were 1640 period.

Augustine Warner patent 1642 his dau Mildred Warner d 1700 md 1691 to (1.) Lawrence Washington and had children of:

1. John Wash md Katherine Whiting of Gloucester Co.
2. Augustine lived Westmoreland Co, VA – father of George Washington.
3. Mildred md Roger Gregory and had 3 daus.
 - a. Mildred Gregory md John Thornton
 - b. Frances Gregory md Frances Thornton
 - c. Elizabeth Gregory md Reuben Thornton (Frances & Reuben are brothers)

One of these Mildred's either the mother or the dau, married 2nd to a Col Henry Willis founder of Fredericksburg and had a son.

- (1.) Col Lewis Willis (had dau md Landon Carter)
- (2.) Dau – Anne Willis md Duff Green

Colonel Lewis Willis had a grandau. named Mildred Carter-dau of Landon Carter.

In the Gloucester Co records a Francis Willis & Hugh Gwinne were representatives or burgesses to the James Town Assembly about 1652-57 period.

The above Augustine Warner had another dau named Mary Warner, she md John Smith Jr b 16 - d 16 - - of Col John Smith that had md 1653 a Anne Bernard wife ----- . The Col John Smith was speaker of house in Gloucester in 1657 period.

The John Smith Jr was later one of the Councils to Governor with Col Geo Reed, Col Geo Ludlow, Mann Page, John Lewis & Matthew Kemp.

The Warner family lived in the N River Area of Gloucester and Washingtons & some Smiths also. Francis Willis owned home called “ White Hall” located on left side of Ware Neck at upper part about even with the town White ____, which you can locate on a map. It is on the water front. Warner Hall is below White Marsh a little & to right on a little neck of water.

Gloucester was originally the part that is now Mathews Co and consisted of 4 Parishes which were Petsworth Parish; Abingdon, Ware & Kingston. Kingston was later in Matthews Co.

The Thomas Robins (patent 1642) – wife Mary Hansford . Armisteads & Throckmortons were also early Gloucester families & all are connected to Pemberton lines & also Thornton family so I found all this quite interesting although not one Pemberton name is mentioned. The Caroline Co, VA wills before Civil War are destroyed also.

At this point I am not sure whether I'm a Rucker or a Tanner ____d so have kept assorted notes on both families. Let me first show you my line – maybe you can “identify me”! And then I'll jot down my notes with references – perhaps there will be some you do not have.

My connection with the Rucker family would be through the Browne family (my grandmother was a Browne).

Geo. Pemberton Browne, son of Rev Daniel Browne and Mary (Polly) Pemberton, was born in 1775 in KY- probably Christian Co. He married two times and I'm not sure by which marriage my ancestor, his son, John Tanner Browne, was born.

According to the book Rev Daniel Brown of Culpeper Co, VA. & allied families. John Tanner Browne was born Oct 26, 1815.

It further states that he was the son of Geo. P B & his 1st wife, Hardenia Tanner. Then it says Geo married 2nd Nancy RUCKER_ Jan 13, 1813. The 1850 Census of Green Co, Ala. shows John Tanner was born 1813-1814 & his brother Theron (also by Hardenin T) 1817. If you know anything that might help clear up this matter I would really love to hear it.

Hope my sparse note one of some help. I will look forward to hearing from you.

I have found a lady with a Rucker book who will copy the Pemberton – Rucker parts for me and I did get a letter from a Mr Wm Pemberton there in Ohio he had a Richard. G-G-grandfather that had 2 wives but their names were not known to him but he was real nice and sent his family line as far back as he knew. He may be of my line eventually. I have run across 2 small bits of Willis information that might mean something to you.

John Freeman of Richmond, VA married Sallie Willis she died 1818 a daughter of Wm Willis.

John Freeman & Sallie Willis had issue: Samuel, Royal, John, Wm Henry, Sarah, Mary & Reuben the family moved to a Quaker Settlement in Ohio (where is Quaker Settlement in Ohio?).

Elizabeth Gregory daughter of Roger (son of Roger Gregory b 1690) and Mildred (Washington) daug of Lawrence Washington. King & Queen Co, VA. Elizabeth Gregory md 1st Henry Willis in 1743 he is son of Colonel H Willis. 2nd husband Reuben Thornton 3rd husband Dr Thomas Walker Explorer her 4th husband Col Aleack of British _____.

At least you know some Willis were around Richmond, VA & in King & Queen Co, VA. Richmond seems to be in Henrico Co, VA. Write the Virginia State Library, Richmond, VA and inquire about Willis- wills for those two counties.

They will give a list of which ones had will & what years made.

The wills are \$1 apiece.

John Anderson Metcalf my grandfather gave me most of this information and he will be 90 in September. He was the grandson of John Anderson Willis of above daughter Charlotte Willis b abt 1860.

According to granddaddy John Anderson Willis had brothers: Tom, Sam, Will, Dave, and sister Polly that married first time an Eaton and 2nd time Jim Shelton. All of the brothers were in the Civil War and Sam was killed. They had a half-brother Jim also.

John and Dave were in Unicoi Co, Tenn. Will was at Del Rio, Cocke County, Tenn. Jim lived in Knox County, Tenn. And Polly lived in Cocke County, Tenn.

Granddaddy thinks that their father was Benjamin Willis and their mother was a Reid. I do know according to the census of 1880 Unicoi County, Tenn John Anderson Willis' father and mother were both born in NC.

Thank you very much for checking on the publication. You must have gone right there for I received it in just a few days. I meant for you to keep the 1.00 in case I didn't owe it to them, but maybe I can send you some material to help in your search at least I'll keep trying.

I am very much pleased with the book. It has a lot of information and the maps are most helpful.

In regard to our Carter search, It is pretty positive that Barnett Carter was the father of Henry and William; and William's children (he married Martha McKinsey 1782 in Albermarle and all their children were born there) were Alexander 1784, Elizabeth 1786, Milly 1788, Nancy 1790 and William Jr 1792. I am trying to prove that the Alexander mentioned here is my Alexander (born 1803 in Albermarle) father. There is an Alexander B in Patrick Co later where William and Martha went, but in any land transactions Wm Sr only mentions Wm Jr. So I have a theory that he Alex may have died young and that his wife and children came to Ohio and that my Alex is one of these children or the child (I believe the Alexander B in Pat Co may be a bro to Henry and William.)

Mr C O Willis is no doubt descended from this Henry (bro of William) as he had an application for pension that he had secured from a relative with the same signature as the application for pension that I received from the Archives for Martha. This Henry (her brother-in-law) had written a letter to help her in her quest for the pension. There seems to be no doubt that it is the same handwriting. Maybe he could tell you more than I have. I believe he believes that he is descended from Anderson Carter son of Henry. I understood that he has two Carter lines.

If you have any material on a Barnett Carter who could be father to William and Henry – probably born in late fifties (I mean William and Henry were) it would be a big help. I think he Barnett may have gone to Henry Co, Vir. about 1798 or so and possibly died there. I'm going to try and locate a will or estate settlement of some kind in Henry Co. Mr CO couldn't find him in Patrick Co. Some of the family did go to Henry Co first and then to Patrick and then on to Stokes Co, NC.

Mr C O is of the opinion that this Henry married Sarah White, Dec 13, 1785 and in his will Jan 19, 1837- he named children John N Carter, Nancy Payne, Mary Payne, Winston, Anderson and Geo W Carter.

Barnett Carter was probably born around 1730 or so.

There is a Bernard Carter listed in the 1785 –90 census for Albermarle and I so think it possible that the names have been confused since William could not write he had dictated the material for his pension application and I thought a mistake could have been made there.

I understand there is a new list of that census and I'm going to check it at the first opportunity.

Thank you again and if there are any more questions about this, I'll be pleased to answer.

I received another copy of the Lawrence Co history the other day. You must have used a bit of persuasion of some kind. I was happy to have it tho. It surely is an awful lot of information in a small publication.

I have been working (in my mind) on a possibility to shed some more light on Alexander and his parents.

I have a record of an Alexander Carter having bo't in Scioto Co, Vernon Twp from a Mr John White 27+ acres of land for \$125 in 1831. Now since Alexander having been married in 1825 and having several children it seemed doubtful that he had saved money since he worked at the Clinton Furnace. I'm inclined to believe -so- it seems likely that he may have received some money from an estate. This record was in Portsmouth but if his parents or mother had remained in Lawrence Co (as I think probable) then any estate or will or bequeath to Alexander would have been registered there in Lawrence Co.

Would it be an endless job to search for any bequeath to an Alexander Carter, between the yrs say of 1825 to 1831? I'm not sure which office or offices they would be found in, but I'm sure you do. I'm inclined to think they may have lived in Winston or Elizabeth twps, but I'm not at all sure. You might look there first if you have time to do this for me.

I know it will be more difficult since you don't know the names of the parents but if Alexander's father were dead before it could be his maternal grandfather or his mother. So if I were looking I would simply look for any gift or mention of Alexander Carter in any settlement between those yrs.

I'll be glad to pay whatever you consider fair as you have always been very reasonable in the past.

I'm still planning on getting back there by Fall, but if you can find anything it may hurry my search a bit.

I read in the September Helper of your interest in the name Carter in North Carolina. We have been intently searching for the name of the wife of Josiah Bridges who died in Hartford County, NC in 1820. We knew her name was Charlotte but not her maiden name. Recently a man who has done considerable research on the Bridges lines mentioned in a letter to me " Josiah Bridges and his wife Charlotte Carter", but he gave no reason or reference for this.

Your query mentioned Stokes Co, N C. In 1842 the daughter of Charlotte and Josiah was a participant in a Tennessee deed; it mentioned James and Priscilla (the daughter) Goodman of Stokes Co, NC.

An older member of the Bridges family in NC had always heard that Charlotte (born between 1755-69) had come from England and had no family in the Hartford area. Cannot prove or disprove this.

Your writer over the past 18 months has built-up a very extensive collection of CARTER data covering a good portion of the Southern States, as a result of trying to trace his own CARTER line out of Alabama to their point of origin in Virginia.

To date I have a vast collection of Carter data for: Bertie County , NC; Northampton Co, NC; Halifax, Nash Johnson, Hartford, Chowan , Gates & Edgecombe Counties, North, Carolina. Also for the following: Georgia Counties I have an excellent collection of both DEEDS, WILLS & MARRIAGE BONDS: Warren, Greene, Hancock, Putnam, Elbert, Talbot, Wilkes, Columbia, Richmond, Laurens, Oglethorpe, Liberty, Baldwin, Clarke, Franklin, Crawford, Coweta.

I also have the entire 1850 Census of Alabama for the name CARTER, plus many land lotteries, tax lists, etc for Georgia of the name.

All of the above is a result of trying to trace my immediate ancestor CADER CARTER out of Alabama in 1840 and with considerable luck into Greene Co, GA and from there thru a Power of Attorney back into Bertie Co, NC. In trying to determine his relationship with the many other CARTERS in Bertie & surrounding counties, I was then led back into Isle of Wight Co, VA to the earliest ancestor.

The point this brings me to is that in trying to determine relationships, I have had to collect all of the above data, plus more in the offing, due to the various branches duplicating the same names in each generation, both in NC & in Georgia. The Puzzle of the Carter family is still far from solved but is becoming more definite each day, as new data is uncovered.

I would dare say at the present, that this family of CARTERS will turn out to be the largest one in the South, even larger than the Capt Thomas Carter Family of Lancaster Co, VA which intermarried with the DALE family.....BUT TO ESTABLISH THIS, I need YOUR HELP.

Common names to this family that appear in both Georgia & North Carolina are: KINDRED, JOHN, WILLIAM, MATHEW, SAMUEL, ISAAC, JESSE, JACOB, CULLEN, MOORE, GEORGE, BENJAMIN, THOMAS, ALEXANDER, JAMES, etc.

It is also your writers belief that families closely related these Carters were; Kindred's, Cullens, Willkins, Moores, Dickinsons, Rhodes, Kinchens, Whites, Pilands, Champions, etc.

Dear Mr Willis,

Thank you very much for the Willis material and your letter that came today. I took it to Miss Margaret Davis this afternoon and she was very grateful for it as she says it gives her some clues to proceed on.

I have been wanting to get in touch with you and Mr Clyde Massie. Do you know him? The attic is almost in as great a mess as when I started work up there in 1969-70! The commissioners got together some old unimportant records to be submitted to the Records Commission of the County for possible disposal. After they act, the list goes to the State Bureau of Inspection. If we can clear a space or so like this, we can get to more records and hope to locate the gaps in the important ones.

The two sorts of questions that have stumped me have been those relating to “suits of partition” and to “power of attorney” records. You may have discovered these, but in case you haven’t: - POWER OF ATTORNEY records (relating to the sale of real estate) are listed in the deed book indexes (1817-about 1872) in the column headed : “consideration in deed” as “P A” . These seem to join those POWER OF ATTORNEY RECORD BOOKS No 1 (1876-) to date, that are shelved under the windows of the 5th St side of the Recorder’s Office. I have not had time to follow through in the Deed Books (from the Index)nor to be certain of this connection. I shall have to be the hound dog, scenting out the stuff! If you and Mr Massie could find the time to verify dates etc. from my discoveries, we might make some worthwhile progress. I asked, in the Recorder’s office, where the old Power of Attorney records were; they showed the Book one referred to, under the windows. It started with 1876 (although they may be not in strictly dated order). I asked for those that preceded Book I, and they said there were none! You see, they know their daily work all right, but no one knows the old records. We shall be helping them, as well as all inquires, if we can back track to 1817 on all the important records.

Again and again letters I get referred to “partition suits”, but no one I asked seemed to know where such records were. I stumbled on to them when I found (in the little new Records Room) in Probate Court, Book 2, rather, Probate Ct Journal no 2 in there, it covered, roughly from 1856-1864. In it are partition suits (under the names of the parties involved); Naturalization records, Adoptions; inquests; officials appointed etc. Probate Court was not established until July 1851. I am still looking for Journal No 1 (1851-1856) ! I have found a portion; Sep 5, 1851- Dec 31 1851 in a book with a binding which says “Commission Resignations” (or something similar). I suppose the new (1851) law caught them unprepared and they used the only blank book they had, no doubt having it copied later into the proper sort of book!

Then, on hunting for this Journal No1, I stumbled on Common Pleas Court Journals, vols 1-4 in the very back room of the Clerk of Courts Office! These cover from 1817-1839, and in the book of Vol 9, I found an official note that they were copies of the original “Term Reports”. These originals I have yet to locate in the attic. These have the same types of information as found in Probate Journal No2. These have the Naturalizations from the beginning of the County . I brought down from the attic “Naturalization Record No 1(covering roughly 1872-1902) and last week another one another which, strangely, seems to cover 1877-1887 (if I remember correctly)! Again, one must be compared to the other to be understood, and I cannot both clean, hunt and compare! I had been told that the Naturalization records were in Cincinnati – Bureau of Naturalization and Immigration! On looking up the law, I discovered that Naturalizations from 1803 to 1905 were under the law of the State Governments – that not until 1906 did they become a function of the Federal government. These books are on top of a green file case in the Clerk of Courts Office, between the office next to the Court Rooms and the one where automobile titles are issued.

Back to the old Common Pleas Court Journals; I think I have located the next ten or more volumes of them in a closet in the Clerk of Courts office, but they are too heavy and high up for me to manage. I think I can get permission for the three of us to go in and see on some Saturday morning. Would you be interested? Also, I think I have found the next several old PROBATE COURT JOURNALS in the attic! Mr Burcham told me some time ago that he would cooperate in furnishing us a space to house these in proper order. I know his personnel are to busy to do the moving, but maybe he would permit the three of us – if we can present him with a plan showing how much space etc. If we can do this, we can inventory the other records in the Court House Offices, giving copies to each, and all inquirers will benefit from this.

Please let me know what you think. I can meet you almost any evening at Briggs – or here at home.

Dear Mr Willis,

Usually New Year's Eve I sit down and write at least a note to all the people who have been good to me – or whom I have neglected. And YOU are one of them on both counts. But I went to Columbus for the holidays and came home all dragged out, so I am late with everything.

I have before as your kind letter, answering my plea for help on the Fudges, dated 3-20-80, For shame on me! It was a lot of help, which I passed on right away to the woman who wrote, I think of you so often, and miss seeing you in the library and the court house.

Since you and Clyde Massie have not been around, I get an awful pile of letters to do from Briggs, Clerk of Courts, the Historical Society and out of the blue, I am always way behind, but I had occasion to write to the County Historian of Niagara County, New York a few weeks ago, and he says he is snowed under too. But he does not try to do any indexing, and advised me against trying to do both. There seems to be no one else to do the letters, and you can't work without tool – so what's a person to do?

I have finished indexing the old naturalizations, 1812-1862, in the Common Pleas Court Journals, Nor 1-11, I have them on cards, not typed up yet, but I can find things. As yet I have them by volume, which is really by date, and some have asked for the names of other people who apparently came at the same time. I guess my best bet would be to make both an alphabetical list and the one by volume (and by date) when I can get to it. Owing to a back injury last March, I could not sit to type or index or do anything, so when it got warm and nice outside, I hired a kid to go with me and we started inventorying the old furnace cemeteries . I think we missed some graves and should go back to correct our cards this spring while the grass is short - if I can find time, I have to start again on the Combined Index to the Lake and Hardesty Lawrence County Atlases. I had it ready for the final typing when I discovered that the girls who had done the original index on cards for Briggs had omitted the section County Organization in Hardesty. It was my fault; they had asked if they should do it – explaining that there was no biographical material in it, just names. I told them to skip it then. But since then I have grown wiser and I know that even a name with a geographical location can mean the devil of a lot! So I made the extra cards. But now I have to pull all the others from the file at Briggs, interfile these and start typing all over again! I can find no one to help do anything. Everyone wants to work on her or his own family line, but no one is interested in doing something that future generations can make use of. I just hope I can get all these things done before "I kick the bucket", as my sons say! I'll be 80 my next birthday, so I have to get a move on!

I still have an old request of yours about a murder trial. I'll find it one of these days. I can't lift the very heavy Complete Record volumes we brought down out of the attic – they are the key to everything old in the Clerk of Courts office. When school is out, I'll get my "little boy" I had last summer – he's taller than I now. I am trying to keep him out of trouble, but I don't think Judge Burwell thinks he's savable! He has had the misfortune to live in a bad neighborhood, and got caught in some minor things. But he is really interested in genealogy now and I think it may give him an interest that will keep him away from evil. I am glad he has grown taller and heavier, so I won't fear to have him lift those heavy books for me as I should have last summer. I think it is remarkable that he will go with me to grave yards or anywhere, dig garden, paint etc, for an old critter like me! Someday on one of our grave yard prowls, we'll find you. Do stay well for I am anxious to see you.

In 1939 my father Charles Robert Rucker visited me here in Washington D C and spent a day at the DAR Library studying the two Rucker genealogy books and then came home and wrote the following:

My brothers were Absalom and James Walter called Watt.

My father was James DeBard Rucker.

My grandfather was Absalom Rucker.

My great grandfather was a blind Minister, Elzaphan but he had another name of Ephraim and he was called "Eph" or "Elsa" for short. His father for whom he was named was in the Revolution.

The first Rucker forefather that I heard about was old Reverend James Rucker. Our people were in what is now called Shelby County before we were in Carter County, Kentucky, but Shelby County had another name when they were first there. (Shelby County formed 1792 from Jefferson County formed 1780 from Kentucky Co) RMW

My mother was Sarah Jane Shearer daughter of Rev Walter Shearer; her mother was a Rice. I used to go to grandmother Shearer's over on Davies Run. They were all fine people and I loved to be with them. My father James DeBard married a second time; Mrs Mary Watson. He is buried with her in the Watson Cemetery. My mother Sarah is buried in Russell Creek Cemetery near my grandfather Absalom and my Great grandfather Elzaphan Rucker. There was some intermarriage between cousins in our family. Many of our family lived on Huff's Run at Willard, Kentucky. My mother died of fever when we moved to a new farm and did not clean out the well properly before we used some of the water.

In 1955, Richard Rucker, 95 yrs old, at Milton, W VA, a son of Elzaphan and Sarah (Prince) Rucker, says that he remembers that his father Elzaphan gave his uncle Elzaphan, who was a

blind minister, a cane so that he could walk down to see him and that Reverend Elzaphan wore a red handkerchief tied to his wrist so that anyone meeting him would know that he was blind. The children used to watch for him the man with the red handkerchief and run to help him. Elzaphan's wife Mary helped him prepare his Sermons.

Richard's grandfather was James Rucker married Jan 19, 1810 to Elizabeth Deatley who was a sister of Mary (Polly) Deatley that married 4 Aug 1808 Elzaphan Rucker Jr. (these marriage's records at Greenup, KY). Therefore when some of their children intermarried – it was the marriage of double cousins.

Richard says that his grandfather's father was in the Revolution. Also, that Elzaphan JR's son Elzaphan was a Doctor and went away but always sent home the money for the taxes, to his blind father, and that Rev Elzaphan had such faith that he always said that the Lord would give him back his eyesight before he died and that this did happen and that during the last three years of his life that he could read the finest print. Richard also said that his father Elzaphan had a brother Sergia, also called Seriah and Ezra, also a brother Bassil and that his cousin Absalom's mother name was Polly (Mary) Deatly.

Cousin Blanche Workman told me that after records was lost in an early flood in KY, that new records were written to replace them. Could that account for confusion of my 1812 Elzaphan and Polly Deatley who were earlier called Ephaim and Mary Deatley. I think so! Cousin Blanche knows so much but she had not always documented the things that historians will accept.

For instance she found where from an old KY newspaper – Elzaphan Rucker were listed and Ephriam Rucker as dying on same day. Same age for both – which proves our point if Ephriam & Elzapham being one & the same man – But she did not say “what newspaper” it was. If in that newspaper it gave the father’s and mother’s name – that might also be your Susannah’s father & mother. A cousin Christopher also died that day 1855 – and they are all buried at Savage Chapel in Russell Creek Cemetery.

Well, we will keep on and I will let you know my findings –

you, but wonder if our lines may not have crossed in certain areas.

For instance, you mention that Anney Rucker m 1808, George Willis; Reuben Rucker m 1808,
Mary I Love; Peggy Rucker m 1808, James Kite; James Rucker m 1810, Elizabeth Deatley;
Elzaphan Rucker 1808, Mary Deatley.

Here is the comparison which I have to offer: in the family of my great-great-great grandfather,
John Kite (Kight) who was born in Westernport, Maryland, in 1784, m in Chillicothe, Ohio,
1805, Catherine Gundy. They lived in Vermillion Co, Ill and Scotland Co, Mo. John Kite died in
Alpine, Wapello Co, Iowa. John and Catherine had among their thirteen children a son, Henry, b
1806, who m a Nancy, last name unknown. Their tenth child (Henry's & Nancy's) was Elizabeth
Kight, b 1846, m 12 Feb_1969 at Danville, Ill, Richard Willis.

John and Catherine's sixth child was Sarah (Sally) Kight, b 4 Feb 1817, m at Danville, Ill, 25
Aug 1836, Abram (Abraham) Lincoln.

I just wondered whether you had any information which would tie these Kite, Love and Willis families together, even considering the difference in time and place.

Here's another mild coincidence which has nothing to do with ancestors or relationship. You mention John and Jane (Rucker) Templeton who lived in White Co, Ind. I'm sorry I was so long answering your letter. I'm glad to hear that you've found a little more Rucker information because I've drawn a blank every place I've tried. So far I can't tie in any of the names you sent me, but I'll file your letter and who knows, maybe some day I can work it in somehow.

I have had a little more luck with my own family, the Weldleys, however, as I wrote to their town in Germany and have received copies of birth and death certificates of my great grandmother and the death certificates of her parents, all of which was completely new information to me, and quite exciting, as I'm sure you understand.

Have you checked out Wyatt Rucker through the library at Salt Lake City? If not you might write to them and see what turns up. The trouble is, there are so many unrelated Ruckers. I was working on a William Rucker (my husband's great-great-grandfather) who is supposed to have been born in Holland in 1809 and died someplace in Virginia, probably near Edinburg, in 1892. However, I haven't had time to really dig into this except to write for a death certificate (no luck) and to ask the National Archives for a Civil War service record. (No luck here either, for there were several William Ruckers who served and I have no way to pinpoint the right one and hate to pay for copies of all the records just on the off chance that I'll be able to identify my William.) I think there's a family out in Bullitt County with an old book which contains some references to a Rucker who was one of the first settlers in these parts and a preacher and I hope to drive out there to have a look at it as soon as possible. I'll let you know what I find.

I have just had a letter published in a magazine Genealogy Corners asking for any information on Ruckers_ among others. I have had few letters and none on Ruckers. I believe people who might have some information useful to us are not interested enough to write.

You do not give the dates of your Milton. I have a Milton (1816-1896) m Margaret Ann. He was my father's great uncle and is buried near Moulton, IA. Appanoose Co, IA. His brother James Robert Rucker (1822-1898) married Hannah Ellis (father's grandparents) He was born "someplace" in Kentucky. Moved with his father (name unknown) to Sangamon Co, IL at age 8. Then to Ogle Co, where he was married to Hannah Ellis. I am told of a brother L Rucker who ran a general store in Moulton and another brother "Hick" Rucker back east somewhere.

James Robert Rucker had ten children as follows: 1) Thomas Carter (1853-1934); 2) Phoebe Jane (Jeanie); 3) Henrietta (Rhetta or Reta); 4) Ella (Hamilton); 5) Ernest; 6) Ulysses Sherman (1865-1950 my grandfather); 7) Eva m Lewis McDonald, lived Bartlesville, OK; 8) Hammond Ellis (1866-1843) lived Western Kansas; 9) Francis Stanton (Frank) 1870; and 10) Milton H which I can find no trace of . Some of the family thought he lived in Nebraska. I do not know his wife's name. Neither have I been able to learn the names of parents of Milton (1816) the father, according to family "conversation" was born in Indiana the to KY, where at least James Robert was born (county not known). He followed JR to Ogle Co, IL in 1844 and was a farmer. I do not know if he came to Wash Twp, Appanoose Co, IA with JR in 1850.

I don't suppose I have been of any help to you, but thought there might be a clue somewhere in names and places. It is a very interesting but frustrating thing I have found. If you should have any information that you would share I would appreciate it very much or if I should learn anything on any Milton I would be happy to forward same to you.

I am hopeful that you got more results with your advertisement than I.

I am terribly embarrassed! As I look through my Rucker file I find your letter of Apr 26 with no notation that it had been answered. Please forgive me. I know how frustrating it is to write and receive no answer.

From the names you sent me, I wrote some but have not had time to write to all – Mrs Richardson from Salem – evidently no connection. Mrs Bobbie Rucker, Louisville, KY- no encouragement. Mrs Fair and Mrs Ray have not answered as yet. But Mrs Davidson from Washington D C has "claimed" me as a cousin and says she has my James Robert (1822) in her data. She was to have it typed this summer. And that dear lady sent me her Rucker Genealogy book (on loan) plus several other records and pictures. But if I am from the James – Elizabeth Deatley line – m 1810, as Mrs Davidson infers, then they would be James Robert's parents.

I have received some information since I first wrote to you. A lady in IA copied IA census records from Appanoose Co, where my Ruckers lived for about 3 generations.

I had James Robert's children and most of his grandchildren etc, but this gave their ages. All his bro Milton's children were listed in the 1860 census, as Mary E, 1800; Margaret 1842; James (Horn) 1845; Alexander M 1846; & Louise 1851. But more important it listed birthplace of father and mother, both as VA, and a Joshua Rucker born 1790 in VA, was listed with Milton and wife in 1870 census. One would think a man that age would be his father – (but perhaps an uncle?).

Also in 1860 census was Isaiah Rucker born 1814 in KY, wife – Sarah Jane Deyo and children: Harriett 1853; James R 1855; Wm N 1858; Elnora 1861; Hiram B 1865; and a Clar ? (not plain) female 1868.

In the Ogle Co, IL History published 1909, Isaiah Rucker was the oldest living settler there – was born at Columbia,, KY. Parent CARTER and Nancy Rucker. He came to Ogle Co, from KY in 1833. My James Robert moved there in 1830 from KY.

So if he was not a brother he must have been a cousin of James Robert. Do you know anything about Carter and Nancy Rucker? They would have lived at Columbia, KY in 1814? And I still do not know what part of KY my James was born.

Well the puzzle continues – I have searched everything I have for your Anney Rucker but no luck. I hope you have learned more.

I have found relatives on both my husband's lines Morehead and Tipton, but can't seem to get much action on my own. I asked Mrs Davidson what she would charge for a copy of her material. I feel it is probably my only hope as I do not have the money to have all the research done that she has done. My husband is a retired logger. He had a heart attack 3 yrs ago but is fine now.

I have been very busy canning – Helped my granddaughter can 69 qts peaches & 49 of pears, then I canned 84 peaches and 49 pears for us. And my sister turned her cucumber patch over to us so I have made about 3 ½ gal Heinz 14 day pickles and have that many more in the brine. Also 50 qts of dills. They are such a nice size I just can't let them go to waste. We also have an Italian prune tree but gave them away as we don't care for them anymore. Do you have lot's of fruit there? We went east of the Mts to get our peaches and gave \$1.50 an apple box.

Again, my apologies and my thanks for all your help. I am still looking for answers to my letters and will also look for anything on Anney.

Dear Descendants of Tazewell County Pioneers:

As you know I am currently compiling a book on early Tazewell County, Virginia records. (See back of enclosed brochure if you have not previously received one.)

Originally the plan merely called for an abstract of the first Order Book of the county. It has been decided, however, to add additional material... at no additional cost. Personal property tax lists for 1801, 1802, 1803, 1806 & 1810; land tax lists for 1802, 1806, 1809 & 1814; militia records for the period; land patents from 1800 to 1820; and military pension applications are some of the items which are now called for.

The 1815 Tax List and the 1820 & 1830 censuses of Tazewell, which have been available for the past two years in booklet form, have been purchased by about 100 genealogists. Some of those who bought mentioned the specific families in which they were interested, so I know that a number of you have common ancestors. I do not have time to act as a clearing house, however, nor do I feel it would be proper for me to give out the name of any one of you to another. It would seem, however, that it would be of value and interest to those who are kinsfolk to know the names, addresses and lineage's of the other individuals who are currently researching Tazewell families. In pursuit of this goal, I have decided to add an "exchange" chapter in the above book. The success of this chapter obviously depends upon YOU!

Our family has collected information concerning George Willis (1754-1827) and Susannah Baker (1757-1843), who were married about 1777 somewhere in Virginia and settled about 1784 in Wilkes County, Georgia. Our interest results from the fact that my wife and children are descended from George & Susannah through their daughter, Elizabeth Dabney Willis (1796-1885), who married John Holmes Milner (1792-1857) and settled in Pike County, Georgia.

After considerable searching and luck, we recently discovered the family cemetery on their old plantation in Wilkes County. Their graves and nine others are clearly marked and the cemetery also contains ten or twelve unmarked graves. Unfortunately, this cemetery was not included in Newsome & Newsome, Wilkes County Cemeteries, 1970, probably because it's remote location kept it's location a secret from all but a few.

We have prepared a three-page statement which includes 1) the eleven inscriptions from the George Willis family cemetery, 2) a map showing the location of the cemetery, 3) the names of the seven children, with birth and death dates where known, of George & Susannah, 4) the relationships of the others in the cemetery to George & Susannah, and 5) references to sources of additional information about the George Willis family. We would be happy to send a copy of the George Willis statement to any interested person. The price, including postage, per copy is six 8 cent stamps or 50 cents in coins.

We shall continue to search for Willis information and are particularly eager to find:

1. The family Bible of George Willis (1754- 1827) & Susannah.
2. The family Bible of James Dabney Willis (born 1793), who married 1) Susan M Johnson and 2) Nancy Tate Anderson. We especially want the date of death of James Dabney Willis.
3. Information about: 1) Stephen Willis (1778-1801), who married Mary Hartsfield. 2) George Dabney Willis (born 1780) who married Susannah B Barkwell and who may have later married Catherine Foster. 3) John Crutchfield Willis (born 1787) who married Rebecca Barkwell. Where did these three sons of George & Susannah settle? Who has information about them?
4. Information concerning the relationship of George Willis (1754-1827) to the Dabney family of Virginia.

The George Willis family cemetery is located in Georgia Militia District 168 in Wilkes County, Georgia. In addition to the graves enumerated above, the cemetery also contains ten or twelve unmarked graves. The farm is known today (1972) as “the Sam Richardson place” and is owned by two sons of Mr Richardson, who is deceased. Some of the property is leased to Mr Dolph Callaway, son of Mr Richardson’s sister, Mrs John Allen Callaway.

The cemetery was discovered on a hunting trip by C E Pollock, MD, of Washington, Georgia, who kindly guided us to the spot. The plot is enclosed by a substantial stone wall which varied from three to five feet in height. A large oak, about three feet in diameter at the base, serves as a landmark for anyone searching for the cemetery in the surrounding pine forest.

Notes

George Willis (1754-1827) was a Revolutionary War soldier who came from King William County, Virginia, to Wilkes County, Georgia, in 1784. Susannah Willis (1757-1843) was Susannah Baker before her marriage to George, but we do not know the names of her parents nor where she was born. George & Susannah were the parents of seven children: 1) Stephen Willis (1778-1801), married Mary Hartsfield. 2) George Dabney Willis 1780-), married 1807 to Susannah B Barkwell. He may have been the George D Willis who was married in 1811 to Catherine Foster. 3) William Willis (1784-1793). 4) John Crutchfield Willis (1787-), married Rebecca Barkwell. 5) Richard Jefferson Willis (1789-1866); married first 1812 to Christiana (called Kitty) Jossey (1793-1847), daughter of Henry Jossey & wife Mary Hill (1758-1831); married second 1848 to Sarah Elizabeth Foster. Richard had plantations in Wilkes County & Greene County, Georgia. He was Sheriff of Wilkes County (1818-1819), 1826-1827) and represented Wilkes County in the General Assembly (House 1828-1831; Senate, 1832, 1834-

1836) of Georgia. 6) James Dabney Willis (1793-186?); married first in 1822 to Susan M Johnson, daughter of William Johnson (died 1821) & wife Nancy Hill (1770-1839); married second 1824 to Nancy Tate Anderson (died 1860). James settled on the George Willis farm and he and many of his family are buried near George & Susannah. James represented Wilkes County in the General Assembly (Senate, 1841). 7) Elizabeth Dabney Willis (1796-1885), married in 1814 to Rev John Holmes Milner (1792-1857), son of Pitt Milner (1769-1839) & wife Apsilla Holmes (1770-1854). John & Elizabeth settled in Pike County, Georgia.

Susan Johnson Willis (1826-1830), William Anderson Willis (1830-1831), Wilson Lumpkin Willis (1833-1858), James Anderson Willis (1838-1858), and George Willis (1844-1845) were eight children of James Dabney Willis & Nancy.

Mattie B A Willis (1855-1857) was a daughter of Thomas Richard Willis (1827-) & wife Elizabeth F Marshall and granddaughter of James D & Nancy.

Who was Molley Wade (1856-1857)? Please let us know.

Where are the George Willis and James Dabney Willis family Bibles today?

As to the surname Rucker, I have very little but will give you what I have. It is a allied Family to our Ebersole's of Knox Co, Ohio.

Jack Rucker was born in Monroe Co, Ohio, Civil War Vet. It has been told that the Rucker Family there owned saw mills and were of an old English descent. Jack Rucker married Azuba Farley and had 5 children.

It has been told that jack drank excessively and often frighten his wife Azuba. After the Civil War jack came home one night very intoxicated and scared his wife. She fled into the night with her two daughters (leaving her son in care of the Ruckers). Azuba (Farley) Rucker was not heard of again in that area for years to come. Azuba (Farley) Rucker came to Fredericktown (Knox Co) Ohio some time after 1871 lived on S Main Street and made a living as an expert seamstress.

Dear Mr Willis,

I want to say I sure appreciate your trouble in getting that cemetery information for me. That and the information from Dr Weed's book helped a lot - - more than 50 new persons I didn't have before.

Sorry to take so long to answer your letter. Been real busy only recently had any time at all to spend on genealogy. When I finally got a chance to go to the genealogical library, I found a bunch more Boothe descendants because of that item you sent me from the Ironton Journal. I didn't know Druzilla Langdon had moved from VA to Ohio. She was a sister of Daniel Boothe and Adah Boothe (wife and first cousin of Robert Boothe). There are a lot of Langdons in the censuses of Lawrence Co. Some are not her descendants but descended from her husband's first marriage, but it's easy to figure out which is which and that adds a couple of dozen more Boothe descendants. Do you know of any Langdons who are interested in family history?

That Ironton Journal item was especially interesting because it is the best clue I have seen as to where the Boothes came from. As I said before, there is a story about George Boothe coming over from England and he was supposed to be son of a nobleman, but I don't know if any of that is truth. I'd be very interested if you find any more news of that organization.

I sent off to the National Archives for military records of Andy Boothe, Robert C Boothe and Elliot Earles.

If the records for Andy Boothe have anything interesting or new information I will send you a xerox copy of them. Also the records of Robert may solve whose son he was.

You said you were trying to find the farm of Andy Boothe. I think there is a way to figure out the exact location from a government map. I have seen the general index to deeds for 1818 to 1862. His main property was located in section 8, township 1, range 16, which would be section 8 in Union Twp. under "Remarks" it says "South west" which must mean it was in the southwest part of section 8. There is probably a map at the courthouse which shows exactly where that is. He acquired this land in 1855, deed book volume 16, page 566 to 572. The deeds may describe the land more exactly. He had 160 acres in section 8 plus 40 acres in section 18. He also bought 85 acres in Fayette Twp, or Lawrence Twp., but didn't keep it very long. Also some other little pieces of land he didn't keep. If the description of his land in the deed is not enough to figure out where it is, it would be possible to trace it down to now by finding out who got it after his death, and who bought it from that person, etc. it would all be in the records but probably more trouble than it is worth. Anyway if nobody around there knows anything about him it might not be any use to locate the farm.

I am not sure about that Robert Campbell Boothe born 1822 who appears in Robert's household in 1850.

He doesn't fit into the list of Daniel's children. My guess is that he is a son of the Henry booth in the 1820 census, who owned a lot in Burlington from 1821 to 1825, but I don't know enough about Henry to say for sure.

I would like to get more accurate information on both families and their descendants. Particularly the children of Robert are listed on shaky evidence - - all those who don't fit as children of

Daniel. The census age of Merit Boothe doesn't fit exactly with Robert's marriage date, but the census could be off a bit. On the other hand, he could be connected with Henry Boothe instead. E P Willis's information may help.

I would appreciate info, from grave markers, especially Daniel and Mary. A friend of mine is working on a book on the McAlexander Family and the correct dates for Mary's birth and death would be really helpful.

Robert Booth's sister Rachel's granddaughter Lydia E Hylton married Peter Willis. That may have been in Floyd Co, VA; she was born 1852. There are some Willises in Dutchess Co, NY, census records. There were still Willises in Floyd Co. in 1944 - - probably still there.

I was interested that Andrew J Booth was a Baptist minister. Wherever I find info, on the Booth's religion it is always Baptist. My great-grandmother, Mary Ellender (Boothe) Dix was credited with getting the first Baptist church in El Reno, Okla, started.

I know of one Brammer descendant that you may be interested in contacting or telling Mrs J P Galloway about. She is Mrs Mary E McCoy, R F D #3, Kahoka, Mo 63445. She is a descendant of Robert Brammer (son of John and Elizabeth Brammer), who married Hannah McAlexander (daughter of William McAlexander) April 10, 1810 in Patrick Co, VA. They lived in Bath Co, KY, after leaving VA for about 7 years around 1820, then moved to Jackson Co, Ind, and finally to Decatur Co, Iowa in 1855. Hannah died there Dec 17, 1863 and Robert on Feb 4, 1882. Mrs McCoy seems to have quite a bit of information on the Brammers, especially her part of the family. I have not heard from her in about a year. She was born 1897 or thereabouts, I think.

That Samuel Langdon 1769-1868 was the husband of Drucilla or Zilla Boothe, b 1795. If you have the information from the grave markers of the other Langdons that could be of help. If there are a lot of them I could tell which ones I need information on, as some are descended from Samuel's first marriage so not Boothe descendants.

Today there seems to be a great and rising interest in the study of one's ancestry. In fact this study, genealogy, is the third most popular hobby in the United States today. Undoubtedly many genealogists are motivated by a strong interest in history, but many more are also concerned with establishing a clear family identity, getting to know one's current relatives, becoming aware of one's past relatives, and gaining the satisfaction, interest, pride, challenge and perhaps even humor that comes from such knowledge.

My personal interest in family genealogy was sparked a few years ago, when, browsing through the library at the University of Kentucky, I discovered a copy of Sudie Rucker Wood's THE RUCKER FAMILY GENEALOGY, published at Richmond, Virginia, in 1932. The title instantly captured my attention, so I borrowed the volume for a few days. The text was so authoritative and interesting that I soon decided to find a copy for my own library. Seven or eight years passed as I searched book lists and old book stores without success. Then last summer I happened to be passing through Richmond, Virginia, and recalling that the printing had been done at the old Dominion Press, I called the company to see if they might be able to direct me to a copy. They were very helpful and did provide information that led eventually to a copy owned by Mrs Eva Rucker Davidson of Washington, D C.

During correspondence and eventual personal conversation with Mrs Davidson, I learned that the author had once expressed the hope that a new edition of her work might again become available. Unfortunately, Mrs Wood passed away a few years ago without seeing this hope fulfilled. Although the author would have undoubtedly been able to add much new knowledge to a new edition of the original is now being readied and should be available in early fall.

For those of you who have never seen a copy of THE RUCKER FAMILY GENEALOGY we have reproduced three pages from the text on the reverse side of this letter. The book contains

585 pages and has one full-color print of the family coat of arms. It is well indexed, and we have added a few blank pages at the end so that you may add your own immediate family records. The printer will need to know by September 15th how many copies we want. At that time we will report the number of pre-publication sub-scriptions – plus an additional number to make the run come out to the next ever hundred. Thus, if you are interested in acquiring your own copy – or gift copies – it is important that you decide as soon as possible and then forward a check to me which I will place in a special account at Berea National Bank where the money will be held until the book is mailed. Mr Morris Todd, President of Berea National Bank, Berea, Kentucky, will be able to verify the above arrangement. The cost is \$12. 50 per copy and includes mailing and handling costs. Kentucky residents should add 75 cents.

Even if you are not personally interested in THE RUCKER FAMILY GENEALOGY, we would like to ask that you use the enclosed pre-addressed envelope to provide us with as many addresses for Ruckers in the United States as possible. We have addresses for less than 2, 000 at present but we have reliable information that our family includes more than 6,000.

Daniel Boothe was the third son and third child of Isaac and Frelove Boothe. His father in turn was almost certainly the eldest child of George Boothe (1737-1813) and his wife Milly, who lived in Montgomery Co, VA., from about 1786 on. It appears that Isaac Boothe remained in New York after his father had moved to Virginia, since several of his children born both before and after 1790 later gave New York as their birthplace. The only suitable Isaac Boothe on the 1790 census of New York is that one living in Dutchess Co, and in 1800 there is an Isaac Boothe living in the same county whose family fits the information from the Isaac Boothe family Bible. It is not known when Isaac Boothe moved to Virginia; it was of course before 1806, Isaac Boothe died in Lawrence Co, Arkansas, in the summer of 1837.

Daniel Boothe lived in Patrick Co, VA, for some years after his marriage, appearing on the 1810 tax list of that county. The tax record shows that he owned one horse and no slaves. He migrated to Lawrence Co, OH, no later than 1817, and appears on the succeeding four censuses of that county. He

The elder Bird Smith appears on Tax List C of Montgomery Co for 1789/90 and on Tax List M of the same county for 1792/3 and appears to have been relatively wealthy for those days, owning five slaves and eight horses. Elizabeth (Betsey) Boothe Smith certainly had died before 1860, (1853) but the exact year is uncertain. There was a marriage in Lawrence Co between Bird Smith and Mahala Ellis on 21 Oct 1855 [4]; the name of Bird's wife on the 1860 census is not clear. If the age of his son Cecil is correctly given as 5, he would have been born between 1 June 1854 and 1 June 1855; Elizabeth's death would have occurred between June 1854 and Oct 1855. Elizabeth was an heir of her father Daniel, who died intestate in the latter part of 1853.

That he was in fact the son of Daniel Boothe is known only from the land records of Lawrence Co. On 28 March 1855, he sold to his brother Andrew his share in the 201 acres left by Daniel Boothe. Unlike his brothers Andrew and Elisha, he was not active in the legal proceedings after Daniel's death, which is a further indication he no longer lived in the vicinity. It is possible that other records will reveal his subsequent residence.

There is a female under 10 at the 1820 census and 10 to 15 at the 1830 census, in Daniel Boothe's household, who has not been accounted for. This daughter, as it seems, must have died unmarried, possibly in the 1830's. At any rate, she was not an heir in Daniel's property.

By doing so, however, he left a valuable list of the heirs of Daniel Boothe (his sisters are listed by their husbands' names): Willis, William R; Smith, Bird; Ward, Shadrack; Spears, William; Earles, Bennet; Boothe, Elisha; Boothe, William; and McCorkle, Martha. Without this list it might be impossible to determine which Boothes in Lawrence Co were children of Daniel Boothe.

Andrew J Boothe served as First Lieutenant in Co A, 173rd Ohio Vol Infantry, enlisting for 12 months on 16 Sep 1864. Military records describe him as 5'8 1/2" tall, with gray eyes, dark hair, and dark complexion. Although no original muster-in roll exists for him, it appears that he had been 2 Lt. Briefly (from 3 Aug 1864) before being commissioned 1 Lt. He was discharged on 10 Nov 1864, on account of typhoid fever, according to information given by his widow at the time of the 1890 census. This reason is not mentioned, however, in his profile from a letter of resignation, dated 4 Nov 1864, which runs as follows:

Dear Mr Willis:

Sorry to be slow in answering your letter, I have been busy. Your information on the Langdons was very helpful, since those were all the right group. I guess it makes sense that the ones living in the same area as the Boothes would be the ones who were related to the Boothes.

This summer I went through the Lawrence County birth records to 1908 on microfilm and marriage records to 1874. The birth records are helpful because they give the mother's maiden name, but the marriage records aren't as good. Compared to Virginia where after 1854 they give a lot of information---parent's names, ages, etc.---the Ohio records only give the minimum information. I tried to get all the information on the Boothes, Earles and Langdons and others who looked like they were related. I figured you already have the information on the Willises.

I am sending a copy of the section I did on Daniel Boothe. I plan to do the same thing for Robert Booth and Drucilla Booth Langdon. I have seen someone else use this type of set-up and it seems to be a good system for including a lot of details and showing the sources of the information. It also can be expanded as more information is found, and there is still a lot more to be found out---later marriage records, death records or if I found a descendant of Daniel Boothe that could give information of Daniel's sons, William and Elisha, I may get a lot more information on them.

There is a man who does volunteer work at the Oakland Genealogical Library (Mormon) a few hours a week, whose grandmother was a Rucker from Lawrence Co. He showed me some of the material he had and there was a tie-in to the Willises also, but he is not a Willis descendant. However, he is interested in the Ruckers so you may want to write to him:

There were a lot of Ruckers in Greenbrier Co, VA in 1810, including the Lemuel Rucker that Mr Woodsworth thinks is his ancestor. A lot of the early settlers in Lawrence Co were said to be from Greenbrier Co, VA.

I may be sending you off on the wrong track with this stuff about New York and Montgomery Co, VA. All I know is that a good number of families from the Montgomery-Floyd-Patrick area of VA did migrate to Lawrence Co, but I don't know if any did so as early as your Willis moved to Lawrence. On the earliest surviving census of Montgomery Co (1810) there are just 2 Willis families—John Willis (3 males under 10, 2 males 10-16, 1 male 26-45, 1 female under 10, 1 female 10-16, 1 female 16-26, 1 female 26-45) and Benjamin Willis (1 male under 10, 1 male 16-26, 1 male over 45, 1 female under 10, 1 female 10-16, 3 females 16-26, 1 female 26-45).

This is from my notes from Marriage Records of Floyd Co, 1843-1925. Sometime I plan to go through that again but I don't know how soon as I have to request it from Salt Lake City library. I'm sure I missed most of the Willis; if I had copied down every person on every related family I would have to copy down the whole record.

Also in Jacksonville District there is a Harvey D Wills--- possibly a Willis if census taker misspelled the name.

Hope this is of help to you. Will note down other Willises if I come across them. Have not received military records from National Archives yet. Samuel Langdon, like the Boothes, had lived in NY.

I found this item in "Ohio, the Crossroad of our Nation", vol 10, no 1 - Lawrence Co. Tax list of March 12, 1818 has Joshua Willis in range 17 township 4. I think that would be Symmes Twp.

You said you had seen 1820 to 1880 census for Willis. I got a look at the 1890 census. The main part of course burned but the special list of Union army soldiers and widows still exists. There are 18 Willises on the census. Maybe you have all that information already, but it gives the company and regiment and dates of service. I will send you the list if you don't have it already. It is also helpful if you want to request military or pension records from the National Archives.

My Boothe ancestors Reuben M Boothe was in the Union army for six months. I got his military and pension records and found some interesting information, including date of his wife's death. In a case where the veteran did not get a pension there would probably not be any information about his wife. I had another Civil War ancestor who was on the southern side and was a prisoner of war in the North for three or four years but cannot find any records of that. He was not allowed to communicate to his family and they all thought he was killed.

Are you interested in the Willises in Floyd Co, VA? I came across some in the marriage records and in the Floyd Press but don't know if there is any point to take them down. If you are interested in them I will copy them down for you whenever I go through those records again. None of the Floyd Press is before 1944.

Have you been able to find the information that E P Willis collected or was that included in the information you already sent me? Sorry to hear that Beulah Blake Weed died because I could have sent Dr Weed some more information on her ancestors.

Thanks again for all the information you sent and let me know if you are missing any of the Willis information I have.

Daniel Boothe was the third son of Isaac and Freelope Boothe. His father in turn was almost certainly the eldest child of George Boothe (1737-1813) and his wife Milly, who lived in Montgomery Co, VA, from about 1786 on. It appears that Isaac Boothe remained in New York after his father has moved to Virginia, since several of his children born both before and after 1790 later gave New York as their birthplace. The only suitable Isaac Boothe of the 1790 census of New York is that one

living in Dutchess Co, and in 1800 there is an Isaac Boothe living in the same county whose family fits the information from the Isaac Boothe family Bible. Charles Wilgus was mentioned in the History of Lawrence County by Paul Brown, but only mentioned. I wish I knew how to find out whether he was the father of Christi-Ann Wilgus who married Sidney Gillett, and where he came from to Lawrence County. According to family information Christiann was born in Pennsylvania, probably betw33n 1801(when Sidney was born) and 1810. Charles Wilgus's will would probably name his daughter if she didn't die before he did, but women often died very young in pioneer times.

Ephriam Rucker who died Dec 1796 in Madison, County, Virginia. He married Margaret Vawter, daughter of John Vawter and Margaret Noll. (David, son of John Vawter, married Mary Rucker in Culpeper County, Virginia. David had a sister, Margaret, slightly younger than he. Madison County was formed from Culpeper County. Perhaps David and Margaret Vawter were a brother and sister who married a brother and sister, Ephriam and Mary Rucker.)

Ephriam Rucker was a Captain of Culpeper Co, VA in 1776 (Continental Army perhaps). On October 7, 1777, he was appointed Lt Colonel.

Mr Willis:

Recently I came across your request for information about Wyatt and Milton of Greenup Co.

Wyatt was in the Revolutionary War. His parents were James, Sr (also a veteran of the war) and Margaret, whose maiden name is unknown. Wyatt's brothers were Merryman, James Jr, Dewitt, Lemuel and Clgathon. If there were any sisters there is no record of them.

James Sr came to the US with his father, Peter Rucker, who became a naturalized citizen on 4/24/1704 and settled in the Piedmont region of Virginia, near an area called "Tobacco Row" (a mountain ridge which I have been unable to locate on maps.)

Peter's wife was Elizabeth Fielding and they came to the U S from England, after their two sons, John and Thomas, had emigrated here. Peter and Elizabeth had nine children, including the two above-mentioned. Their names were William, James Sr, Ephraim, Margaret Tinsley, Ann Cook, Elizabeth Pierce and Mary Offall (the girls names are their married names and I have no more information on their descendents.)

There are two books about the genealogy of the family and I've been "working" on this hobby off and on since 1972, when I began to wonder where my grandfather's family was. He died when I was 4 and his wife died before I was born. I only know of two aunts and one uncle and three cousins. Through legal records of Shelby Co, KY, I've located names of the family that are not in either one of the published books. One book was published in 1927 and in the legal records there is an entry in 1834 and later dates, where my great grandfather purchased land in the Harrisonville area of Shelby Co, but there is no mention of him in that book. That is what got me started on the genealogy of the family. I know now there are other members of the family name, but I do not know them personally. With the death of my father, the family name has died out in this branch of the family tree, as two girls carried the name. The other "girl" is unmarried, retains the family name in Shelbyville, KY, and I visit her occasionally. (She is not interested in the genealogy).

I would like to hear from you, regarding the birth, marriage and death dates of Wyatt's family. The only Milton I have died at age 3. I have "invented" my own numbering system for the generations of the family as so many of them carried identical names. I've also have drawn my own forms for a loose leaf binder. One form lists a person, his children and great-children, plus other important data. On the reverse side is where the information came from. The other form shows a "tree" for five generations back of a person and on the reverse side, it gives information of the immediate family. The numbering system, so far, has shown no duplicate numbers in ten generations from the 1704 naturalized US citizen previously mentioned. I've talked to a man in the Filson Club in Louisville about this numbering and he says if it works out without duplicates, then I've really got something! and to let him know when I get the Shelby Co records "hooked up" with the information in those two published books! Along with searching for my own genealogy, I accidentally stumbled on to the "tree" of George Washington, tracing him back through one of his grandmothers to the first king of England! It was very unusual to learn that members of the same family were the FIRST rulers of two brand-new countries, almost 1,000

years apart! I still get a thrill when I look at that "tree"! I have a full-time job and a family so this "tree" business is strictly a hobby for me. I've got a shoe box of file cards with the names (and numbers) that is a quick reference to a "wanted" name. I had the file arranged identical with the pages in the binder and when I searched for Wyatt, I couldn't find it. So, last week-end, I "turned it upside down" and now I'm working on filing the cards by the first name, then last name (as may women are Ruckers although their married name is different, as are their children). Alas, I've found instance where a Rucker woman married (a man and several generations later, one of their descendants has married a Rucker. There were quite a few "first cousins" marriages way back there! Using my numbering system, I drop the newest number (as if that person died) and continue the lineage with the oldest member, regardless of whether the husband or wife was listed under the oldest number. Where the direct Rucker lineage name cannot be carried on by a male, I'm making an effort to locate the families of the women, and with my numbering system, the "unknown can be conquered"! (I like that phrase!) Hoping to hear from you soon, and may God bless you and yours,

Dear Mr Willis:

I have just recently seen your query in a 1972 issue of Virginia Genealogical in which you ask about the Henry Willis who was a Col in the Rev. I know nothing of him nor even of his existence, unless he be the one who m Mildred Washington and of George. What I do, however, wish to inquire about is whether this son Joshua was the one who married Sallie Thomas and had a daughter (said to have been born ca 1779) named Mildred who m Reuben Medley sometime by 1806 and had chn: John Fletcher, Reuben, Maria Willis, Frances and Sarah Thomas Medley, among others. (This Sarah Thomas Medley was the wife of my great-great grandfather Bryant Neal.) Mildred (Willis) and Reuben Medley (said to be of Madison Co, VA) are said to have come to Kentucky- first around Frankfort, later to Nelson Co- m about 1809 or 1810. I find no verification of the statement that Mildred was the daughter of Joshua Willis and Sarah Thomas nor do I find any records of the marriages in either of these generations thus I do not know the Virginia County of origin of this Willis family. I do however find a marriage of a John Willis and Sallie Thomas, although I have lost the reference. (It can be found in Swem.)

I would appreciate knowing what information, if any, you have on these Willises, Medleys and Thomases of mine. I shall be glad to furnish you with any details you desire on my branch.

Are you related to the late Gov Simeon Willis of Kentucky? I do not know whether I am or not.

Later this year our family plans to publish a small book concerning Stephen Willis (born August 20, 1725) & wife Susannah (whose maiden name was Terrell or Dabney) of Hanover County, Virginia, and Rutherford County, North Carolina and their five children, many grandchildren and innumerable great-grandchildren (but not later generations). We have already collected considerable information about these four Willis generations but would appreciate your assistance in finding additional data.

Stephen Willis & Susannah had five children: 1) George Willis (1754-1827), who married Susannah Baker (1757-1843) and settled in Wiles County, Georgia. They were the great-great-great-grandparents of my wife, Patricia Irvin Cooper. 2) Joel Willis (born August 9, 1756), who was living in King and Queen County, Virginia, in 1819. We have four letters he wrote to his brother George, but so not know whom he married nor what children he had. 3) Elizabeth Willis (born September 19, 1758), about whom we have no further information. 4) Stephen Willis (1760-1820), who married Martha Wharey (1761-1846) and settled in Pendleton county, South Carolina, and Red Oak, Brown County, Ohio. Their descendants settled in Putnam County, Illinois, and further west. 5) Susannah Willis (1762-1811), who married Sampson Harris (1763-1807) and settled in Georgia.

We would particularly welcome the following about Stephen & Susannah and their five children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren:

1. The name of the father, maiden name of the mother, and names of brothers and sisters of Stephen Willis (born 1725).
2. Evidence as to whether Susannah's maiden name was Terrell or Dabney. Was she married to a Garland before she married Stephen Willis (born 1725)?
3. Information about Joel Willis (born 1756) of King and Queen County, Virginia: his date & place of death and place of burial; maiden name of his wife and date of their marriage; and the names of their children, if any. Did Joel Willis have relatives in Mobile County, Alabama?
4. Information about Elizabeth Willis (born 1758): her date & place of death and place of burial; name of her husband, if any; where they settled; and the names of their children.

6. Any evidence that the Willis family was related to Thomas Claiborne, Roger Tandy, or William Willis, who were living in New Kent County, Virginia, in 1810.
7. The name and address of the present owner of the family Bible of Joel Terrell (1726-1774) of Charlottesville, Virginia, or of any early Willis family Bible or early Willis letters (particularly any written by George Willis of Wilkes County, Georgia) or letters written by Sampson & Susannah Harris of Georgia.

Thank you very much for any assistance you can provide. Even one new name or date or place would be helpful: no doubt much of the information we want has been lost forever, but we want to preserve what can be found today. We would be happy to share out Willis information with any relative and are grateful for your help.

Your name was given to me by Mrs Phyllis Hammer of Ironton, Ohio as a person who might help me locate some data on my great grandfather, Benjamin Thomas. I know he lived in Lawrence County. He is listed in the 1850 census. He was born in Maryland, I think, came to Lawrence Co from Monroe. Her dates are b 1871- d 1852. He is buried in Laurence Chapel cemetery. His wife was Martha Brumfield. There were quite a number of children- one, Ann married Lanty Rucker. There are several deeds registered indicating land transactions between Benjamin & Lanty in the 1850's (52, 51).

Was he in Lawrence Co in the 1840 census?

Did he leave a will?

Both Benjamin Thomas & Lanty Rucker came from Monroe Co. Lanty's first child was born 1844 in Lawrence County so both families were in Lawrence probably as early as 1843.

Unfortunately the marriage records of Monroe County were destroyed when the court House burned.

Another person about whom I am curious is Lemuel S Rucker. There were several land transactions by him & by heirs of Lem S with Lanty mentioned at times as admin. I don't think the relationship was father-son. I have reason to think Lanty is the son of Ephraim & Margaret Lackbridge Rucker.

Any help as suggestions you can give me will be most welcome.

I don't know if you are still interested in the Rucker family – I have kept you in mind thru out my search – I appreciate so much the dates you sent me on Kites some time ago.

I am in touch with a lady (WVA) who sent some sketchy material. I am writing her back in hopes she will add to it.

First- I have not confirmed my James B Kite was the son of James E Kite and Peggy Rucker – but due to the similarity in names – location-and dates-I'm proceeding with Rucker.

According to Mary Jo Samson, 305 Justice Avenue, Logan, WVA 25601- -

They had a son, James Rucker who married Margaret Elsaphan. Their son , Ephraim Elzaphan Rucker married _____Randall.

They were the parents of Elsephan and James who married the Deatley sisters, Reuban m Mary Love, “your” Susannah and possibly “my” Margaret “Peggy”.

I hope the lady will send me some dates and places for the Ruckers.

I obtained an estate settlement for James E Kite, it only mentioned Margaret who I assume was his wife Peggy Rucker , he died in 1826, Lawrence Co, Ohio.

I am going more and more in circles with my genealogy. I recently learned that my German ancestors, John Henry Snyder and wife Mary Elcessor arrived in America in the early 1800's , they met and married at Barboursville, WVA. A John Rapp married a sister of Mary Elcessor and they all settled around Rappsburg-Mason twp. Evidently other Elcessors arrived there also, several sources have mentioned a number of them buried out in that area along with Rapps.

And today I hear from Clyde Massie, of your area, he mentions a brief obit for Margaret (Elcessor) Rucker in the old Ironton Register for Nov 30, 1893.

In 1936 my father, Charles Robert Rucker of Canada visited me and while here he spent a day at the DAR Library studying the Rucker Genealogy books there and he then came home and wrote the following:

My brothers were Absalom and Watt (James Walter)

My father was James Debard Rucker.

My grandfather was Absalom Rucker.

My great grandfather was a blind minister, Elsaphan called Elza and also for short but also had a name Ephraim. He was blinded in the War of 1812 by the flash of fire of the cannon. His father was in the Revolution. The first Rucker forefather that I heard about was old James Rucker. (brother of Lemuel) Some of our people were very early in Shelby Co, Kentucky and other counties adjoining.

My mother was Sarah Jane Shearer daughter of Reverend Walter Shearer. My grandmother was a Rice and I loved to go to their house over on Davies Run. I spent much time with Grandmother Shearer – they were all fine people.

My father James DeBard, married a second time, Mary Watson, who was Mrs Mary Pennington. My mother Sarah Jane was called Sally, she died of fever as we used some well water when we moved to a new farm, before the well had been properly cleaned out. She was about 32 years old when she died. She is buried at Russel Creek Cemetery near Willard, KY. My father James Debard is buried with his second wife Mary in the Watson Cemetery near Willard, Carter Co, KY. There are some intermarriage among cousins in our family. Many of our family lived on Huff's Run in Carter Co, KY.

PETER RUCKER

Peter Rucker, first of the name, settled in Virginia about 1690. The tradition is that he was a French Huguenot, shipwrecked near the mouth of the James River, and that he swam ashore, living there for a time.

Peter Rucker may have been a French Huguenot, for he was naturalized with a number of French men. We know, too, that his children were Protestants. His son, John, in 1832, assisted in locating an Episcopal Church.

From the German Element in America by Herrmann Schuricht, Vol 1, page 43, in reference to the French and German migration. Numerous migrations of French Huguenots and Calvinists from Alsace and Lorraine came to America, settling in tidewater Virginia.

A careful search in London does not show that Peter Rucker lived in London before coming to America c. 1690. Mr C E Lart, of London, an authority on the French Huguenot emigration, says the name is certainly German or Dutch.

Elizabeth, wife of Peter Rucker, may have died in 1752.

James Rucker, son of Peter born in Essex, died in Greenbrier County married Margaret -----.

He sold all of his land in Culpeper before 1770 and in 1782 appears on George Poage's list of Heads of Families of Bath County; James Rucker Sr, James Rucker Jr and Wyatt Rucker on the Greenbrier River Section.

James Rucker, Sen, patented and bought land in Augusta and Bath (later Greenbrier) on the Middle fork of Greenbrier River, some of which he deeded to his sons.

To the East of the river, near the Southwest corner of Bathe County, is a pass called "Rucker's Pass", through the Allegheny Mountains, into Greenbrier County. We find the will of James Rucker, Sr. Therefore we do not know all of his children, but the Ruckers of the next generation living on the middle fork of Anthony's Creek, we are taking for granted to be children of James Sr, every available clue having been followed and all of the records studied with the following result, which is very meager.

DEATH OF AN OLD PIONEER

Joshua Willis at the age of one hundred three years, lacking a few days, died March 28, 1869. At the residence of Elza Willis near Marion, Aid Township, Lawrence County, Ohio. Joshua Willis was born April 1766 in Monroe County, now West Virginia. Was in a fort three or four years in 1769, 70 and 71 on New River Virginia. Came to Guyandotte about 1800. He help to raise the first log cabin built at that place. Was one among the first emigrants in Ruckers Bottom. Lived at Russell's Place, now called Getaway, in 1808, Moved to Marion in 1812. In 1812 he was building the Wilson Water Mill at Marion. The first mill built in Lawrence County, Ohio. He was drafted in the War of 1812, when he hired his brother Hugh to go substitute and he continued to finish and run the mill.

He helped to build the Salt Works in Jackson County, Ohio in 1824. He also took a contract on the Canal, near the Licking Summit Cutoff. The timber 120 feet in width, one mile in length and then grubbed up the stumps 60 feet. He had a strong constitution and remarkable good health. His teeth were all sound when he died.

Joshua Willis piloted the Methodist Episcopal Ministers – Elders, Hunters and others- through Lawrence County and also Falia county in 1817, 18 and 19. When they preached every day except Mondays. It took four weeks to get around the circuit. He was a

When he became old and feeble he continued to read the Bible as long as he could see through glasses. Was a sober man all his life. On the 4th day of July 1868, he was struck with paralysis and never could stand on his feet afterwards. He was a very industrious man also. His cottage was always the home for the hunter and the traveler was never turned away hungry.

On Friday evening March 26th, he said he had suffered a long time, but his suffering would be over soon. He then sang with a strong voice.

“When through the deep waters I call thee to go,
The rivers of woe shall not overflow,
For I will be with thee thy troubles to bless
And sanctify thee in thy deepest distress.”

March 28th, 1869 at 5 o'clock PM he suffered the last pang.

SUDDEN DEATH OF ELZA WILLIS

On last Thursday, Elza Willis, of Marion, in this County (Lawrence Co, Ohio) was at Campbell Brammer's Justice of the Peace, engaged in the case of the state vs Thomas Bennett, for shooting Walker Wilson. The matter had just been settled for the day and all were getting ready to go away. Mr Willis stood near the porch and was saying that the matter had been arranged as well as possible and they would all be back Saturday morning to complete it. The remark had scarcely passed his lips, when he began to reel and then fell full length, his mouth striking on the edge of the porch. Our informant, who was the first to take hold of him, said he never spoke a word and there was hardly a pulsation after he fell. He had not been excited and at the moment was cool and apparently as well as he had ever been. Just a while before he was talking about the boys being unable to work hard. They were to weak, but "us old fellows" said Elza, beating himself on the breast. "We are the ones that can stand it."

Elza Willis was widely known in this county and was a man of firm convictions and bold in declaring them. Every one had a hearty salutation for him whenever he was met. We say him a day or two before he died and had a long talk with him. He was an old resident of this county and was an active man in it's early days. He was probably 55 or 60 years old.

Elza Willis born in this county at Russell's Place, now called Getaway, June 8, 1808 died Aug 24, 1871, age 63 yrs, 2 mos, 16 days. Son of Joshua and Mary Blankenship Willis. Frank B Willis Stricken Here at OWU

Delaware County, Ohio, might have gone down in history as the birthplace of two presidents, Rutherford B Hayes and Frank B Willis.

But fate stepped in on March 30, 1928. That was the night when Senator Willis was stricken with a Cerebral Hemorrhage minutes before he was to address a cheering throng in Gray Chapel during his campaign for the presidential nomination. Willis was climaxing his 29 year career in politics with a bid for the highest office. He died in the office of the president of Ohio Wesleyan University, across the corridor from the Chapel auditorium.

Willis was born in Berlin Township on Peachblow Road on December 28, 1871. He attended schools in Berlin and Berkshire Townships and was graduated from Galena High School. He was a graduate of Ohio Northern University where he received his master's degree in 1894.

Taught at OWU

He was elected state representative from Hardin County in 1899 and served one term. Then he returned to ONU to teach law, history and economics. He failed in his first try for congressman from the eighth district in 1904, but in 1910 he was elected to the House of Representatives.

During his two terms in the house he fought for pensions for needy Soldiers, a duty on veal and more protection for the growing labor movement. In the midst of his busy life in the capitol, he found time to enter and win a spelling bee sponsored by the National Press Club of Washington. The winning word was "hydrocephalus".

Following in the footsteps of Rutherford B Hayes, Willis returned to Ohio in 1914 to throw his hat into the gubernatorial race. To the surprise of many he defeated the reform administration of James M Cox, a Democrat.

The new governor was warmly received by the press and the people, especially after he insisted on being inaugurated outside the state house so that the public could witness the ceremony.

Defeated For Re-election

Governor Willis' program was one of economic retrenchment and conservative government. He preferred to create an atmosphere of cooperation, refusing to browbeat or bully the General Assembly. This was severely criticized in the press which accused Willis of failing to provide effective leadership.

He made further enemies by tightening the requirements for civil service jobs and reducing the salaried and numbers of governmental workers. In 1916 Willis was defeated for reelection by Cox.

Four years later, Willis was back in the political spotlight with his famous words that swept Warren G Harding to the top of the Republican ticket; "Boys and Girls, let's nominate Harding".

Willis stepped into the Senate seat vacated by Harding and started again on the program he believed best for the people, prohibition, high tariffs and adequate Merchant Marines, pardons and paroles for prisoners and America first. He was reelected to the Senate in 1926 by an overwhelming majority.

Then Calvin Coolidge made it clear in 1927 that he would not seek reelection, Willis announced his intention of running in the Ohio primary. The campaign was complicated a short time later when Herbert Hoover also decided to run in Ohio.

FRANK B WILLIS Stricken As He Neared Peak of His Career;
Fatal Evening

But the Senator from Ohio had many things in his favor and it was in the midst of a vigorous campaign that he had come to Delaware on March 30, 1928 to address a rally on the campaign.

He attended a dinner that evening at Kiwanis Club, then watched a parade in his honor from the porch of the Hotel Allen. He and his wife, the former Allie Dustin of Galena, followed the cheering throngs to Gray Chapel where they were seated on the platform with other Republican party leaders.

A few minutes before he was to address the cheering throng, Willis left the platform, whispering to his wife that he was not feeling well and needed a breath of fresh air. He collapsed in the hall.

Willis was a handsome man of imposing stature. He was a clever and challenging campaigner and was at his best at informal party rallies, church socials and rural get togethers.

He had a rich booming voice which could be fashioned to meet any demand. One of his greatest political assets was his uncanny ability to remember faces and names.

His home county honored him a few years after his death by naming the new high school in Delaware after him. (WILLIS HIGH SCHOOL)

More on FRANK B WILLIS

As the son of a soldier he labored faithfully in the interest of the veterans of our wars. He was elected Governor of Ohio in 1914, serving two years. In 1920 he was elected to the United States Senate to succeed Senator Warren G Harding, who on the same day was elected president of the United States. On the resignation of Senator Harding in January, 1921. Senator Willis through appointment by Governor Davis, took his seat in the Senate a few weeks in advance of the date on which he began his elected term. His ability to see clearly into the heart of problems early won him membership on four important committees of the Senate Foreign Relations, Immigration, Territories and insular possessions and Commerce.

In 1924 he became chairman of the committee on Territories. Senator Willis has spoken in almost every historic spot in America. In 1916 he presented the name of Honorable Thedero E Burton for President and in 1920 the name of Honorable Warren G Harding. In the estimate of many men the speech he made nominating Mr Harding is the best one ever delivered to a Republican National Convention which actually helped the candidate in whose behalf it was made. His expression. "Say, boys and girls, let's nominate Harding", uttered spontaneously, caught the Convention and aroused it to a pitch of enthusiasm not hitherto reached during the Nominating speeches.

The Senator's wife was Allie Dustin, whose father and mother are prominent residents of Galena in Delaware County, Ohio. They were married July 19, 1894 and have one daughter, Helen. The family home is maintained in Delaware, Ohio.

Willis Family of Delaware County, Ohio (1926)

The Willis family of Delaware County is one whose name has been prominently and worthily identified with the annals of American history from the early Colonial period, and the family has been established in Delaware County, Ohio for Ninety years. (prior 1926)

About four miles distant from Historic Plymouth Rock, Massachusetts, was established the original home of the Willis family. The material for this ancient dwelling was brought, ready framed, from England and arrived on the Second or Third voyage of the Mayflower. The house was erected at Kingston, Massachusetts and was well supplied with furnishing brought likewise from England, records well as many family heirlooms, showing that both in England and Massachusetts. The Willis family had been one of appreciable wealth and influence.

The original member of the Willis family to come to Ohio and settled in Delaware County was Buckley H Willis, whose wife was Susan Bartlett whose mother was born in the Historic and Storied Old Wayside Inn at Sudbury, Massachusetts.

Buckley H Willis was reared in Old Bay State. There his marriage occurred and thence, after living for a time in Vermont, in 1834 he came with his family to Ohio and settled in Delaware County. Mr Willis was a virile type of manhood, not afraid to face the hardships of Pioneer life. He attained some measure of distinction in Concord Township because, for a number of years his was the only Abolition vote cast in that Township. When the Republican Party was organized he immediately identified himself with it and was an influential factor in the organization of the New Party in his home County.

Ten children were born to Buckley H Willis and his wife. These in order were; Cornelia, who became Mrs Cutler of Columbus; Brainard, who resided on a farm near Belle Point, Delaware County, until his death at the age of ninety two years in 1922; Jay B (father of Frank B Willis, United States Senator), a farmer of Delaware County, died 1920, age 86 years; Plynn, a Physician, residing near Ostrander, Delaware County; Emily; Henry, a farmer residing near Hyattsville; Rollin K and Frank A whose sketches appear hereafter; Elbridge R , who became distinguished Minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church and now resides in California; and John B, who was assistant Editor of the Christian Science Monitor and now resides in Massachusetts. Of these sons four served in the Armies of the Union throughout the War of the

Rebellion; Not one of them was ever compelled to enter a Hospital as a patient at any time, a splendid tribute to the type of manhood of the family:

Rollin K Willis, who now resides in Delaware, Ohio. Was born on the old homestead farm in Delaware County, September 26, 1843 and there he was reared to adult age. At the age of Eighteen years he went forth as a gallant young Soldier of the Union in the civil War. He having been a musician in the band of the Forty-eighth Ohio Volunteer Infantry, with which he served until the close of the War. He has in his possession a piece of his Regimental Flag he aided in saving at Fort Donalson, where he and others of his Command were captured. The Flag of the Regiment having by them been buried in the Confederate Prison and having eventually been brought home with the Regiment. Mr Willis Participated in many engagements and lived up to the full tension of the great conflict. In February 1868, Rollin D Willis wedded Alice Elisabeth, daughter of Miner P and Orilla G Tone, who came from New Hampshire and settled in Delaware County, Ohio. Mr Tone having been one of the specially successful sheep growers of the County. Mr and Mrs Willis became the parents of four Children. Roy, now deceased, married Pearl Crumb, and they had one child Dorothy. Myrtle, became the wife of James Morse, of Boston, and they had four children; Myrtle, Alice, Grace, and Eunice. Mr Morse is now deceased; Rolla married Ethel Bovey and they have three sons; Wilbur, Paul and Vernon. Grace youngest of the children died in California. Mrs Willis died some years ago and later he married Miss Mayme Harter. Mr and Mrs Willis are active members of the Presbyterian Church and he is affiliated with the Grand Army of the Republic.

Note: Wilbur Willis died 1966.

FRANK B WILLIS

Frank A Willis was born on a pioneer farm in Delaware County, September 28, 1846. His youth was spent on this farm, in the work of which he assisted during (unable to read two words) , while he attended the winter terms of school until he was (last unable to read). In his native County he continued as a successful and prominent exponent of farm industry until 1913, since which year he has maintained his home at Delaware, the county seat, April 25, 1867, recorded his marriage to a daughter of Frederick and Margaret Berlet. Mr and Mrs Willis have one child, Nellie, who is the wife of Myron Champion of Delaware. Mr and Mrs Willis are zealous members of the Presbyterian Church and he is a stalwart Republican in Politics. Jay B Willis, the father of Senator Willis, was born in Dorset, Vermont and remembered distinctly the trip made by his father and mother and their children over the Old Erie Canal to their new home in Ohio, where on January 24, 1856, he married Lavina Buell. Shortly before the Civil War they journeyed by wagon to Western Iowa and Missouri, but after two years there, preferring Ohio, they returned to Delaware County and continued to reside there until their deaths.

They reared three sons; Buell, a farmer of Lewis Center, Delaware County, (he died 1954, age 97 years, married 73 years. Buried Oak Grove Cemetery, Delaware, Ohio).Lloyd a prominent real-estate man of Chicago, Illinois, died 1948, age 85 years, buried Oak Grove Cemetery; and Frank Bartlett, who was named after his uncle Frank A of whom specific mention has been made in this context. A daughter Dottie died in 1877 at age of two years.

Frank Bartlett Willis, Forty-fifth Governor of Ohio and present United States Senator has through his good character, achievement and service signally honored the family name. He spent his youth on the farm attended and taught country school, attended the High School at Galena and then became a student at Ohio Northern University, Ada, Hardin County, Ohio.

It was in connection with his choice of Ohio Northern that he First evidenced that spirit of independence and ability to stand on his own feet, which has been the characteristic of his life, refusing the proffered financial assistance of his parents. The future Governor made his own way through College and the same time earned an enviable record for scholarship. Following his graduation and a post graduate course in law he became an instructor in the law department of his Alma Matar, where he taught for several years. Not only becoming thoroughly familiar with the

laws of the land, but also building up a large circle of friends among men who have been destined to play a considerable part in public affairs throughout the State. In 1906 he was admitted to the Bar.

As a young man Mr Willis became interested in politics and 1898 stumped the state for William McKinley. In 1899 he was nominated as the Republican candidate for Representative at the time in the Legislature belonged to that Party. Mr Willis rode from house to house on a bicycle making the most through personal canvass of the country. Mr Willis played an important part in the Legislature in which he served for two years. He attained distinction through his connection with the Reform of Tax measure in Ohio. The Willis Tax Law, compelling home and foreign Corporations to pay a certain percent on their capital stock into the treasury annually, is still one of the fundamental feature of the taxation system of his state. In 1910 Mr Willis was elected to Congress from the Eight Ohio District , which was composed of Campaign, Delaware, Hardin, Hancock, Logan and Union Counties, defeating Thomas C Mahon by a vote of 21, 030 to 19, 519. In 1912 he was one of the three Ohio Republican Congressmen returned to their seats, receiving a plurality of 1,414 over honorable W W Durbin, of Kenton, all through his district gave the Democratic candidate for Governor a plurality of 4,967. In Congress Mr Willis quickly achieved distinction. He won a reputation for independence, great industry and ability to take care of himself in debate. He jumped from obscurity to National fame in a single day by a speech he made in the house of Representatives on the Arizona-New Mexico Statehood Bill.

The Willis voice, one of his assets, quickly became know in the House. It is big, booming voice, rich, round, with a touch of middle Western nasal twang seeping into it now and then. Apparently without effort it's owner can fill almost any Auditorium in which he speaks. Throughout his Congressional career and representing a great wool producing district, Mr Willis always occupied a prominent part in the fight for the continuance of a Protective tariff policy, and particularly of a tariff on wool.

PETER RUCKER

Peter Rucker, first of the name, settled in Virginia about 1690. The tradition is that he was a French Huguenot, shipwrecked near the mouth of the James River and that he swam ashore, living there for a time.

Peter Rucker may have been a French Huguenot, for he was naturalized with a number of Frenchmen. We know, too, that his children were Protestants. His son, John in 1732, assisted in locating an Episcopal Church.

From the German Element in America by Herrmann Schuricht, Vol I, page 43, in reference to the French and German migration. Numerous migrations of French Huguenots and Calvinists from Alsace and Lorraine came to America, settling in tidewater of Virginia.

A careful search in London does not show that Peter Rucker lived in London before coming to America ca 1890. Mr C E Lart, of London an authority on the French Huguenot emigration, says the name is certainly German or Dutch.

Elizabeth, wife of Peter Rucker, may have died in 1752.

JAMES RUCKER

James Rucker son of Peter born in Essex, died in Greenbrier County married Margaret-----.

He sold all of his land in Culpeper before 1770 and in 1782 appears on George Poage's list of Heads of families of Bath County; James Rucker Sr, James Rucker Jr and Wyatt Rucker on the Greenbrier River Section.

James Rucker Sr patented and bought land in Augusta and Bath (later Greenbrier) on the Middle fork of Greenbrier River, some of which he deeded to his sons.

To the East of the river, near the Southwest corner of Bath County, is a pass called "Rucker's Pass", through the Allegahany Mountains, into Greenbrier County. We find no will of James Rucker Sr. Therefore we do not know all of his children, but the Ruckers of the next generation living on the middle fork of Anthony's Creek, we are taking for granted to be children of James Sr, every available clue having been followed and all of the records studied with the following result, which is very meager.

After my best respects to you all I can inform you that I am not very well at this time I have got the Diarrhea and has had it for 34 days but I am getting a good deal better sense we have got back here which was July 2d 64 well Betty you and Purlina wrote me a letter being dated June 2d I received it on last b)? day knight and this is Sunday following I am in hope these few lines may find you all in the best of health you wrote for me to write to you and tell you who was our Officers, General Hunter is our Major Gen. He is over all the West Va., troupes and General Sullivan he is wat is called Major General he has charge of the first Division and Creek has the charge over the 2d Division which is the one we 5th Va is in and we are in the 1st Brigade 2DIV. 8 army Corps General Haze is our Brigadier General there is 6 or 8 Regiments in a Brigade one General over each Brigade our Regimental Officers is not change yet ust veterans still serve in our old Regt. yet same as before well Betty we have bin to old Stanton Lexington Salem Libberty Buckhannon on the James River and from there to Lynchburg we was gone two months and had to do a good deal of hard fighting. Well, Betty we had liked to all Starved to death on this trip we had to live on quarter rations for 20 days 5 days a bite now and then as we could get it at houses by force we had to rob for our lives or Starve and 5 days without anything our wagons meet us 15 miles the other side of our old Camp Gauley with plenty of provisions so when I saw the wagons I was a good deal like Jacob of old when he saw his Sons wagons I could not keep from shedding tears and had like to a fainted and when I got something to eat I lay down thinkfull to God for his mercies and goodness to me and went to sleep after which I awoke I felt much better and come on untill I have got just below the mouth of Elk River in site of Charleston. This is all at this time.

Daniel’s first wife died between the middle of 1850 and June 1853. On June 16, 1853, he married Martha Arbaugh (born about 1803). He died before Dec 26, 1853, when the Journal Record of the Probate Court has an entry for “Elisha Boothe and Andrew J Boothe , heirs at law of Daniel Boothe deceased vs Martha Boothe, widow and relict of Daniel Boothe deceased.” Daniel left no will and she claimed she needed more money than she was getting. She remarried on Jan 5, 1856 to James McCorkle.

Mr WARREN has never been married and through industry and good management he has accumulated quite a competency, his Birth-Place was SOMERSETSHIRE, ENGLAND, and the date OCTOBER 4, 1829.

His father JOHN WARREN, died AUGUST 7, 1858, and his mother CECELIA (HANNA) WARREN, died APRIL 5, 1832. Mr WARREN served in the late WAR as SECOND LIETUENANT of COMPANY D, 1st NATIONAL GUARD of LAWRENCE COUNTY, but the REGIMENT was never ordered to the FRONT. His brother WILLIAM WARREN, enlisted in 1861 in the 5th VIRGINIA VOLUNTEER INFANTRY and SERVED THREE YEARS. He was in many hard fought battles and in the battle of WINCHESTER, JULY 24, 1864, where his right leg was AMPUTATED and he died in CONSEQUENCE, AUGUST 7, 1864, leaving his wife to mourn his loss. Mr WARREN'S , Post Office address is IRONTON, LAWRENCE COUNTY, OHIO.
